## Mission and Ministry of Our Congregation

The Vacancy Committee has asked me to look at the area of Mission and Ministry of the congregation. We may well have done this before, but, we are going into a vacancy and as we know, the shape of the congregation has changed over the years, so it is important to look at it again.

So, we, as a congregation will be looking at where God is calling us, where the Spirit is blowing us, where Christ is leading us, in the months ahead. It may be that an outside facilitator is appointed to help us through this journey, it maybe we do this this together with Bob Gould, our Interim Pastor, the Bishop will no doubt know what is best.

As we are disciples, following Christ, not members of a club, this task is not like a business plan to be simply sat down and decided. We need first and foremost to pray and listen to God's call for us, to be open to the action of the Holy Spirit and notice where the Spirit is blowing us.

This will be a process of discernment – this may happen quite quickly or it might take a little longer. What we, as a congregation are likely to be paying attention to are those things we don't want to lose sight of, what energises us, what brings life, what brings love, joy, peace. We might also begin to notice those things that we can let go of, the things that weigh us down, sap our energies, feel heavy or deadening. These are some ways to listen to the Spirit, Jesus promises us life and life in abundance, so if we look for those things that happen/we do at St Mary's and around in the community outside the confines of the buildings, we will discover God's mission and ministry within and amongst us.

Yes, sometimes it may be hard, there may be different views about things, but that is healthy and helpful, if we can express them whilst listening to each other and Christ, our head, then a creative new way forward may well emerge.

As we discover God's call to us at St Mary's to take forward God's mission and ministry, then we can put this in the parish profile and that will then attract someone who feels energised by those things,

to accompany us on the next part of the journey to which God is drawing us.

If anyone would like to chat about this with me, I would be very happy to meet and have a conversation with you.

## Stewardship

"Oh no!" I hear you cry, "Geoff will be asking us to dig deeper into our pockets, and we are already giving as much as possible and/or giving of our time in some way."

You are right of course. Every couple of years or so, on behalf of St Mary's, I ask us all to review our giving.

We are approaching the end of the church's financial year, and for about the last 10 years in a row, there has been very little difference between total income and expenditure. In other words, we are managing to keep the reserves we had built up in the bank. BUT (and you knew there would be a "BUT"), we are entering a period of uncertainty, with Deryck's retirement and an interregnum of indeterminate length; at the same time the costs are gradually increasing.

We are extremely fortunate to have the Douglas family's continuing generous support. Beyond this, the income generated by the weddings held in St Mary's has been sufficient to maintain the reserves. There is however evidence in general terms that fewer couples are getting married in church, so that income stream may decline.

An underused facility is the Douglas Hall, spacious and well equipped, but due to our location compared to halls attached to churches in Edinburgh, is difficult to let. Therefore, if you know of any group that could make use of it, please let a member of the Vestry know. It would be ideal for Badminton!

The plain fact is that Congregational giving alone is not sufficient to cover costs, and it is the "extras" mentioned above that help keep St Mary's bank account healthy. The age profile of the congregation is not ideal, and we need more young couples to compensate for us oldies. We also have to consider that the location of the rectory may not be the ideal home, should a young person with family be appointed, who may wish to be housed in a local village.

As we move to a new chapter in the life of our church, we need to be able to demonstrate that St Mary's is a vibrant congregation, and that

we do everything we can to support it, including, of course, financially.

So, dear friends, if it is possible to increase your regular giving, or support St Mary's with a one-off donation, we would be extremely grateful. We are aware that some of you may not wish anyone to know the level of your giving and this we readily accept, but I can promise all of you who contribute by direct debit or cheque, that the treasurer, and myself as stewardship/HMRC contact, keep the sums you give to St Mary's completely confidential.

How often have you heard people saying: "I don't know what's happening. They never tell you what they're doing". I admit as Vestry Secretary I've often failed to measure up. But, did you know that all the Vestry Minutes are in the plastic rack on the wall of Douglas Hall? They are there to keep you informed (as long as you don't remove them). If anyone ever wants a copy of the Minutes then just contact me and I will arrange.

If you get the chance to read them you will see that we as a Vestry are very busy and more so now that Deryck has retired. On any one day, we are discussing mending a broken-down lawn mower, what to do about the church tiles, weekend opening of the church and a

whole variety of issues, some very personal. The Vestry has spent many meetings this year discussing the state of the church floor tiles and what to do with them. John Oldcorn, in particular, has been heavily involved in this. We are looking to clean and spray the tiles as well as restore those tiles which are cracked, and estimates



are being sought for this work. It can be very rewarding to be a part of these and other discussions. We will be looking forward to welcoming new members following the AGM.

The last few months we have been very busy. As well as having our monthly Vestry Meeting we are also having meetings of the Vacancy Committee which consists of all members of the Vestry as well as two co-opted members. The Vacancy Committee has been very busy compiling a Congregational Profile. We are required to outline as much information as we can about the Church for the benefit of any applicant for the vacant post. John Blaber, but others also, have put a lot of work into this and for that we thank them. It's in the final stages of completion and once completed will be sent to the Bishop for his approval and a copy will be made available also to the congregation.

We are in the very early stages of the interregnum; we had our mandatory meeting with the Bishop at the end of October. There's a lot more work to be done and we will be calling on certain members of the congregation, as we have already done, to help us with the various tasks that have to be completed. Alan Coupe will also be keeping the congregation up to date now and then.

In addition to the work previously mentioned, several members of the Vestry were busy preparing their reports for November's AGM.

One new and exciting development is that both Lord and Lady Morton have shown an extremely keen interest in the workings of both the Vestry and the Vacancy Committee and have been very conscientious about attending these meetings. Lady Morton is also in the process of arranging for two new bells for the Belfry and work has already started in that the old bells have now been removed. For this we are extremely grateful to both Lord and Lady Morton. So, once the two bells are installed we will have both a ding and a dong! I've no doubt we will be looking for bell ringers in the not too distant future. So, all budding campanologists be aware!






#### Fingall's Cave

The sea was extremely calm and the skipper of the boat told those of us who had decided to take the trip that we were very lucky to be seeing Staffa at its best.


The inside of Fingall's Cave was an amazing sight. The rock formations were very impressive. The roof had a cathedral like quality.

Programme Notes for Advent and Christmastide Alan John Phillips

# Sunday 27<sup>th</sup> November - First Sunday of Advent

Prelude: Nun komm, der Heiden Heiland (BWV 659) – Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750)

Hymns: **24**, **342**, **32**, **28**, **346** (tune 205)

Communion: Nun komm, der Heiden Heiland (BuxWV 211) – Dieterich Buxtehude (ca.1637-1707)

Voluntary: Wachet auf, ruft uns die Stimme (BWV 645) – Bach 'Stay awake' is today's gospel message, so Philip Nicolai's grand hymn 'Sleepers, wake!', written at the time of a great plague in Westphalia 1597/98, takes centre stage both as our offertory hymn and Bach's well-known chorale prelude on it. Two other organ versions follow in the next two weeks. 'Nun komm, der Heiden Heiland' is a Lutheran version of the mediaeval office hymn 'Come,



Prelude: Dir, dir, Jehova, will ich singen (Op.65 no.24) – Sigfrid Karg-Elert (1877-1933)

Hymns: 27, 384, \*99, \*25, \*221

thou Redeemer of the earth'

Communion: Es ist ein Ros' entsprungen – Johannes Brahms (1833-1897)

Voluntary: Wachet auf, ruft uns die Stimme (Op.65 no.33) - Karg-Elert

'Dir, dir, Jehova' is the original of the tune 'Winchester New', sung today to 'On Jordan's bank' (AMNS 27). The gradual hymn, 'Lo, in the wilderness', is set to a fine tune by the Norwegian cathedral organist Ludvig Matthias Lindeman, a contemporary of S.S. Wesley, and is very well-known in its native land.

#### Sunday 11th December - The Third Sunday of Advent

Prelude: Wachet auf, ruft uns die Stimme (Op.68 no.5) – Flor Peeters (1903-1986)

Hymns: **470**, **\*325**, **Longing for light** (CH4 543), **\*407**, **\*317** (tune 101) Communion: Rejoice in the Lord alway (from the Mulliner Book) – Anon.

Voluntary: Postlude on 'Hanover' – Eric Thiman (1900-1975) 'Rejoice in the Lord' is a keyboard arrangement of a lost anthem, taking its text from the Latin introit for today, beginning 'Gaudete' – Rejoice!

#### Sunday 18th December - The Fourth Sunday of Advent

Prelude: Toccata and Kyrie della Madonna (from 'Fiori musicali') – Girolamo Frescobaldi (1583-1643)

Hymns: 360. \*224 (tune 185), 26, \*178, 484

Communion: Toccata per l'Elevazione (from 'Fiori musicali') –

Frescobaldi

Voluntary: Toccata on 'Veni Emmanuel' – Andrew Carter (b.1939) Frescobaldi's 'musical flowers', published in Venice in 1635, comprise three sets of pieces designed to be used liturgically at Mass. The pieces played today are from the set composed for feasts of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

'O come, O come, Emmanuel' (AMNS 26) is a hymn made up of the antiphons (refrains) sung before and after the Magnificat during the last nine days of Advent. Carter's magnificent toccata on the tune is in the style of the French romantics.

#### Saturday 24th December - Midnight Mass

Prelude: The people that walked in darkness ('Messiah') – George Frideric Handel (1685-1759)

Hymns: 37, \*58, 34, \*294, 40, 35

Voluntary: For unto us a child is born ('Messiah') – Handel

#### **Sunday 25th December - Christmas Day**

Prelude: Prelude on 'This endris nyght' – Healey Willan (1880-1968)

Hymns: \*103, \*39, 39, \*355, 35

Communion: How beautiful are the feet ('Messiah') – Handel

Voluntary: In dulci jubilo (BWV 729) - Bach

Willan, born in Balham, south London, emigrated to Canada at the age of 33 where he became one of the best-known professors and composers in that country.

Bach's exuberant setting of the well-known Christmas hymn has become the standard conclusion of the Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols at King's College, Cambridge.

#### **Sunday 1st January - The Naming of Jesus**

Prelude: Three Versets on 'Away in a manger' – Mark Blatchley (b.1960)

Hymns: 148 (tune \*418), 354, 122, \*21, \*288

Communion: St. Peter – Charles Hylton Stewart (1884-1932)

Voluntary: Radetzky March (1848) – Johann Strauss senior (1804-1849)

Sydney Carter's wonderful 1961 Christmas hymn 'Every star shall sing a carol' is subtitled 'A carol of the universe' in AMNS. Did Christ only come to save Earthlings - are the 'sheep who are not of this fold' ETs?

As the New Year's Concert from Vienna is so much a part of European New Year tradition, it would not be right to end our service today without at least one piece of Strauss!

#### Sunday 8th January – Epiphany

Prelude: Wie schön leuchtet der Morgenstern – Niels Gade (1817-1890)

Hymns: 49, 48, 51, 42, \*314

Communion: Interlude on the Coventry Carol – William S. Lloyd Webber (1914-1982)

Voluntary: Wie schön leuchtet der Morgenstern (BuxWV 223) – Buxtehude

Two settings of Philip Nicolai's other great hymn 'How brightly shines the morning star' today, both by Danish composers. Gade was born exactly 200 years ago on 22<sup>nd</sup> February this year. The mention of Herod in the gospel for today prompts the inclusion of a meditation on the Coventry Carol, which our choir sang at the Carol Service.

#### Sunday 15th January - The Second Sunday after Epiphany

Prelude: Christ, unser Herr, zum Jordan kam (BWV 684) – Bach Hymns: **312**, **526**, **53**, \***416**, \***99** 

Communion: O Lamm Gottes unschuldig (BWV 1095) – Bach Voluntary: Tu es petra – Henri Mulet (1878-1967)

Bach's depiction of the baptism of Jesus requires the organist to be a juggler. In my right hand, I hold Jesus and John, in my left hand I hold the river Jordan, and in my feet I have the chorale melody. 'You are the rock, and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it' is

the title of Mulet's great toccata, the tenth of his 'Byzantine Sketches' (1914-19), inspired by the architecture of the basilica of Sacré-Coeur in Paris.

#### Sunday 22<sup>nd</sup> January - The Third Sunday after Epiphany

Prelude: Chorale Prelude on 'Dundee' – Charles Hubert Hastings Parry (1848-1918)

Hymns: 345, 115, \*172, \*387, \*75

Communion: Christ, der du bist der helle Tag (BWV 1120) – Bach Voluntary: Overture to 'St. Paul' – Felix Mendelssohn (1809-1847) The tune 'Dundee', from the Scottish Psalter of 1615, is set at AMNS 52 to 'The people that in darkness sat a glorious light have seen'.

'Christ, der du bist der helle Tag' is a Lutheran version of 'O Christ, who art the light and day', an office hymn for Compline.

The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity climaxes on the feast of the Conversion of St. Paul. Mendelssohn's oratorio opens with this grand overture based on the chorale 'Sleepers, wake'.

#### Sunday 29th January - The Fourth Sunday after Epiphany

Prelude: Chorale Prelude on 'Rockingham' - Parry

Hymns: 125, 138 (tune 237), \*123, \*384, \*159

Communion: Après un rêve – Gabriel Fauré (1845-1924)

Voluntary: Toccata – Théodore Dubois (1837-1924)

Parry's chorale prelude on 'When I survey the wondrous Cross' is from the same set of Seven Chorale Preludes, published in 1912, as his prelude on 'Dundee' last week.

Fauré succeeded Dubois as organist at La Madeleine in Paris. The song 'Après un rêve' was originally published in 1878.

Dubois' Toccata is no.3 of a set of 'Twelve Pieces for organ or pedal piano' published in 1889, whilst he was organist at La Madeleine, which has a four-manual organ by the great French organ builder Aristide Cavaillé-Coll.



#### The Huron Carol

The "Huron Carol" (or "Twas in the Moon of Wintertime") is a Canadian Christmas hymn (Canada's oldest Christmas song), written probably in 1642 by Jean de Brébeuf, a Jesuit missionary at Sainte-Marie among the Hurons in Canada. Brébeuf wrote the lyrics in the native



language of the Huron/Wendat people; the song's original Huron title is "Jesous Ahatonhia" ("Jesus, he is born"). The song's melody is based on a traditional French folk song, "Une Jeune Pucelle" ("A Young Maid"). The well-known English lyrics were written in 1926 by Jesse Edgar Middleton, and the copyright to these lyrics was held by The Frederick Harris Music Co. Limited, but entered the public domain in 2011.

The English version of the hymn uses imagery familiar in the early 20th century, in place of the traditional Nativity story. This version is derived from Brébeuf's original song and Huron religious concepts. In the English version, Jesus is born in a "lodge of broken bark" and wrapped in a "robe of rabbit skin". He is surrounded by hunters instead of shepherds, and the Magi are portrayed as "chiefs from afar" who bring him "fox and beaver pelts" instead of the more familiar gold, frankincense, and myrrh. The English translation uses a traditional Algonquian name, Gitchi Manitou, for God, which is not in the original Wyandot version. The original lyrics are now sometimes modified to use imagery accessible to Christians who are not familiar with Native Canadian cultures.

The original words of the carol in the Wyandot language (Huron):

Ehstehn yayau deh tsaun we yisus ahattonnia O na wateh wado:kwi nonnwa 'ndasqua entai ehnau sherskwa trivota nonnwa 'ndi yaun rashata lesus Ahattonnia, Ahattonnia, lesus Ahattonnia. Ayoki onki hm-ashe eran yayeh raunnaun yauntaun kanntatya hm-deh 'ndyaun sehnsatoa ronnyaun Waria hnawakweh tond Yosehf sataunn haronnyaun lesus Ahattonnia, Ahattonnia, lesus Ahattonnia.

Asheh kaunnta horraskwa deh ha tirri gwames Tishyaun ayau ha'ndeh ta aun hwa ashya a ha trreh aundata:kwa Tishyaun yayaun yaun n-dehta Iesus Ahattonnia, Ahattonnia, Iesus Ahattonnia.

Dau yishyeh sta atyaun errdautau 'ndi Yisus avwa tateh dn-deh Tishyaun stanshi teya wennyau aha yaunna torrehntehn yataun katsyaun skehnn lesus Ahattonnia, Ahattonnia, lesus Ahattonnia.

Eyeh kwata tehnaunnte aheh kwashyehn ayehn kiyeh kwanaun aukwayaun dehtsaun we 'ndeh adeh tarrya diskwann aunkwe yishyehr eya ke naun sta lesus Ahattonnia, Ahattonnia, lesus Ahattonnia.

'Twas in the moon of winter-time When all the birds had fled, That mighty Gitchi Manitou Sent angel choirs instead; Before their light the stars grew dim, And wandering hunters heard the hymn: "Jesus your King is born, Jesus is born, In excelsis gloria."

Within a lodge of broken bark
The tender Babe was found,
A ragged robe of rabbit skin
Enwrapp'd His beauty round;
But as the hunter braves drew nigh,
The angel song rang loud and high...
"Jesus your King is born, Jesus is born,

As was the ring of glory
On the helpless infant there.
The chiefs from far before him knelt

"Yuv got tae be deid!"



Perhaps the same Sunday School teacher was observing her class while they were drawing. As she got to one little girl who was working diligently, she asked what the drawing was.


The girl replied: "I'm drawing God."




#### Lots of Love
