

History of St Mary's Walking Group

Starting in 1986, a group from St Mary's walked part of the then recently established Southern Upland Way. Betty and I had previously called into the Episcopal Church in Melrose to see whether we could finish our walk there. The walkers were invited to join in their Saturday evening service, followed by supper, so on the first

Saturday in June we set off from St Mary's Loch to walk the 25 miles to Melrose (in the one day, was fit back then!). To my surprise, many enjoyed the experience so much, that over the next 9 years, we covered the whole 212 miles from Cockburnspath on the East coast, to Portpatrick in the South West.



Between 1986 and 1990, on the first Saturday in June, we walked different sections of the Eastern part of the S.U.W, as far West as Wanlockhead. Then from 1991 to 1994, we spent 2 days walking, staying overnight at Youth Hostels – Kendoon or Minnigaff, so completing the Western section. We had great celebrations on reaching Portpatrick, many of us having walked the whole of the S.U.W.

Many names you will know who either walked (or helped) with the enterprise. Revd Simon Robinson, Revd John Pelham, John Rae, Mary Hall, Robert and Margaret Chill, Stan Zachery and family, Gillian Donaldson. (Val and Bob Lawrie, Myrtle and Southern Burnett, Margaret McMillan, Robert and Susan Erskine, Marianne McMaster, David Johnson, Katy Hall, and Betty, often providing lunch and support in the middle of nowhere).

We also gathered other walking friends during these years, and so decided to carry on getting together over a couple of long weekends every year, staying overnight in Youth Hostels/Bunkhouses from as far afield as the Lake District, 2 in Northumberland, Roybridge, Glen

Doll, Ardgarten, Loch Laggan and Loch Rannoch, and not forgetting Mary's bunkhouse at Caputh, (near Dunkeld).

Sadly, numbers started to drop as we started to age a bit, and the novelty of sharing rooms began to fade. Determined to meeting keep up possible, for the past 5 years we have continued to meet once a year on the first Saturday in June. Initially we used Dalmahoy as the base, walking in the Pentlands



or Almondell/Calderwood Country Park, with supper at the Ratho Park Hotel. Last year we did a walk around Abbottsford, and this year Dunbar, followed by an evening meal at "The Steading", Hillend. There were 15 of us in total, including Janet Dyer, Margaret Hunter, Gillian Donaldson, Maureen Blackwood, John Rae, Mary Hall, Pat and David Syme and myself. We had an excellent time, managing to avoid the rain and storms forecast for the area. We already have ideas for next year, so please consider joining us (age is no barrier!).

Dalmations

The first meeting of the 2017/2018 Dalmations session was held on August 30th. It was very encouraging to see around 25 attendees for the talk with around 19 staying for the soup and pudding afterwards. Hopefully we can maintain this level of attendance as it means that the speaker has a reasonable sized group for their presentation.

The speaker at the meeting was Isobel Morrison, a volunteer, from CHAS. Although Isobel did not use visual aids her talk was very interesting and given in a manner where we could picture the things she was telling us.

We were informed that CHAS has very recently gone through a rebranding exercise which has included changing its name from Children's Hospice Association Scotland to Children's



Hospices Across Scotland. They have also changed their logo from the previous rocking horse to one which is made up of the letters spelling CHAS specially designed by some of the children that they support. The rocking horse still features in the letter 'A'.

The following is from the CHAS website which explains the service they provide better than I can.

CHAS is the only charity in Scotland that provides vital hospice services for children and young people with life-shortening conditions.

We offer care for the whole family in our two children's hospices, <u>Rachel House</u> in Kinross and <u>Robin House</u> in Balloch. We also run a homecare service called 'CHAS at Home' helping families in their own homes across Scotland when they need it most.

We are currently supporting over 415 families, as well as a significant number of families who receive bereavement support.

Our services are funded mainly through the generosity of our many supporters who help us to raise the vital funds needed to provide these hospice services. Isobel talked us through the layouts and rooms within Rachel and Robin houses in a way that we could almost feel we were there. It was clear from what she said that they have taken a lot of input from the children and their families when designing and providing the facilities. One story she told us was that when they asked the children what they would like in 'the den' that the first choice was an armchair as it would give them a chance to relax out of wheelchairs.

The current campaign being run by CHAS is called 'Keep the Joy Alive'. Isobel's talk demonstrated how the staff and volunteers do this whilst making sure it is an inclusive process with the children and families fully involved. Growing Together Roadshows

A series of four roadshows was arranged over the summer of 2017 designed to allow people from Scottish Episcopal Churches (SEC) in the Edinburgh Diocese to meet together to share their experiences of being part of the SEC family with Growing Together as the subject for discussion.

The final gathering was held in St Peter's, Lutton Place, Edinburgh on Saturday 2nd September. Around 120 individuals from a great many congregations within the diocese attended this particular event. Apparently over the four available meetings, representatives of more than three quarters of the 50+ congregations within the diocese were welcomed

The meetings had been organised to promote increased collaborative working between congregations and to raise awareness of common issues facing congregations at present. The Mnemonic SEEDS was used to represent the Five Priorities for consideration and discussion:

S Serving our communities

E Engaging all generations

E Enabling ministry

D Developing disciples

S Sharing faith

I found the day a very worthwhile experience. All congregations have their own concerns but it is amazing just how often the same concerns are expressed by different congregations. I think that the main thing that I took from the discussions was that we should not beat ourselves up too much about the things that we don't appear to do so well, but concentrate on what we do actually do well and perhaps expand on that and be grateful for what we have.

I would also like to express thanks to everyone from St Peter's who were on the catering team. Soups and bread were provided and participants were invited to make contributions to a buffet. An amazing array of foods were available and as usually happens at St Mary's, participants were asked to take away as many of the leftovers as they could use.

Visitors to St Mary's

The story of a search.

Some years ago now, I was at the church about to conduct a wedding. It was just ten minutes before the bride was due to arrive at the church, when I saw a couple in the churchyard who were evidently not guests at the wedding. They were photographing at a graveside. I went over to greet them and I found a young couple, the girl in tears photographing an old stone. It seemed that they had come over from Canada specifically to try and find the resting place of her great grandfather Timmins, whose son and his wife from this area, her grandfather, had emigrated to Canada long ago. They had presumed he was buried in Ratho Church of Scotland graveyard, and had searched there but not found him. Rather sadly and as a last resort on their long search they heard of a churchyard at St. Mary's, and unexpectedly had found him. It was a bit like a homecoming for them.

I realised that a record of her great grandfather's burial must be in the earliest book of records in the vestry safe, so I led them in and found the record of his burial in 1950. I had to leave them there in order to conduct the wedding service as the bride was already at the main door.

After the wedding, the couple were still in the churchyard, and with great delight led me back into the vestry to the same original register book, which of course has baptisms registered as well, for they had found the record of his baptism too. The most extraordinary thing was that his baptism date 1863, was exactly 145 years to that very day, August 16th. They returned to Canada with many photos to record the blessings of that special day.

Programme Notes for October and November by Alan John Phillips

Lots of Lutheran chorales and their preludes in October and November to celebrate the 500th anniversary of Luther's posting of his 95 Theses on the door of All Saints' Church in Wittenberg (pictured right).

<u>Sunday 1 October – Harvest Thanksgiving</u>

Prelude: Divertimento on 'Monkland' – Heathcote Statham (1889-1973)

Communion: Intermezzo on 'Holyrood' – William Lloyd Webber (1914-1982)

Postlude: Songs of Praise (1980) – Herbert Chappell (b.1934)

Choral Evensong

Prelude: Adagio in E major – Frank Bridge (1879-1941)
Magnificat: The Song of Mary – Richard Shephard (b.1949)
Anthem: All things bright and beautiful – John Rutter (b.1945)
Postlude: Songs of Praise (1986) – Robert Prizeman (b.1952)

Two editions of 'Songs of Praise' on one Sunday? The BBC commissioned both theme tunes in the 1980s. Some consider the Chappell to be better than the Prizeman – you decide! The Song of Mary, a metrical version of the Magnificat, was commissioned by the National Shrine of Our Lady of Walsingham to commemorate the millennium. It has since become known as the 'Walsingham Magnificat'.

Sunday 8 October - Pentecost 18

Prelude: Elegy – George Thalben-Ball (1896-1987)

Communion: Gabriel's Oboe ('The Mission' 1986) - Ennio

Morricone (b.1928)

Postlude: In these stones horizons sing – Karl Jenkins (b.1944)

Animal Blessing Service

Prelude: Sheep may safely graze - Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750)

Postlude: 'The Cat's Fugue' (Sonata K30) – Domenico Scarlatti (1685-1757)

The Scarlatti piece certainly deserves a place at an animal service, having been partly 'written' by an animal. Scarlatti's cat Pulcinella is reputed to have composed the fugue subject by walking over the harpsichord keys (Kitten on the Keys?)

<u>Sunday 15 October – Pentecost 19</u>

Prelude: Schmücke dich, O liebe Seele (BWV 654) – J S Bach Communion: Rejoice in the Lord always – Anon (Mulliner Book) Postlude: The Arrival of the Queen of Sheba ('Solomon') – George Frideric Handel (1685-1759)

'Deck thyself, my soul, with gladness' is one of the finest of all Lutheran communion hymns, and Bach dresses the melody in the finest ornamentation. A suitable wedding garment, indeed.

<u>Sunday 22 October – Pentecost 20</u>

Prelude: In the King's Hall ('Sigurd Jorsalfar') – Edvard Grieg (1843-1907)

Communion: Adagio (Piano Concerto in A minor) - Grieg

Postlude: Homage March ('Sigurd Jorsalfar') - Grieg

The prelude and postlude come from the incidental music composed by Edvard Grieg for a play by Bjørnstjerne Bjørnson celebrating King Sigurd I Magnusson, also known as Sigurd the Crusader (Jorsalfar), who was King of Norway from 1103 to 1130.

Sunday 29 October – Reformation Sunday



Prelude: Ein feste Burg – Johann Nicolaus Hanff (1663-1711)

Communion: O Lamm Gottes unschuldig (BWV 1095) – J S Bach

Postlude: Fantasia on 'Ein feste Burg' – Michael Praetorius (ca.1571-1621)

Preludes on two of the earliest of the Lutheran chorales. Luther wrote the words and music for 'Ein feste Burg', a version of Psalm 46, sometime between 1527 and 1529. 'O Lamm Gottes, unschuldig' is an early Lutheran hymn, first published in 1531, with text and melody attributed to Nikolaus Decius. Originally

intended as a German substitute for the Latin Agnus Dei, it became more and more used as a hymn for Passiontide.

Thursday 2 November - All Souls

Prelude: Chorale Prelude on 'Eventide' – Charles Hubert Hastings Parry (1848-1918)

Sunday 5 November - Pentecost 22

Music for the Royal Fireworks - Handel

Prelude: Bouree, The Rejoicing, Minuets I & II

Communion: La Paix Postlude: Overture

'Remember, remember the fifth of November'? I have, and here is Handel's incidental music to an official display in 1749 in London's Green Park. The display was nowhere near as successful as the music itself: it poured with rain and the scenery partly burnt down.

<u>Sunday 12 November – Remembrance Sunday</u>

Prelude: Solemn Prelude (from 'For the Fallen') – Edward Elgar (1857-1934)

Communion: Benedictus (from 'The Armed Man') – Karl Jenkins Postlude: Wachet auf (Op.65 no.33) – Sigfrid Karg-Elert (1877-1933)

In a reference to today's Gospel about the wise and foolish bridesmaids we sing 'Wachet auf, ruft uns die Stimme', another great Lutheran hymn, written by Philipp Nicolai, first published in 1599 together with 'Wie schön leuchtet der Morgenstern' ('How brightly shines the morning star').

Sunday 19 November -Pentecost 24

Voluntary in E flat (Op.6 no.7) – Samuel Wesley (1766-1837)


