#### Double the Love for Children in Zambia

Very many thanks to everyone who donated to Mary's Meals "Double the Love" campaign. New donations during December, January and February up to £2 million were doubled by the UK Government, with the proceeds used specifically to reach more children in Zambia. Mary's Meals has just announced that people



like us gave £3.5 million during that 3-month period, which, with the matched funding, makes an overall total of £5.5 million. This doesn't include the regular donations which many of us give.

This means that 95,000 more children in Zambia will be able to receive Mary's Meals every day in school and can grow up better nourished and better educated, to become the men and women who will lift their communities out of poverty and end their reliance on aid.

More than 360,000 primary school-age children in Zambia are out of school, and those who do attend are often so hungry they don't have the energy to concentrate and learn in class. Mary's Meals has been working with communities in Zambia since 2014 and is already feeding 119,315 children there every school day.

We really are able to make a difference. Thank you.

# Rectory Fencing Report

It was agreed by Vestry that new fencing would be required at the Rectory. Although dog-proof fencing was approved to be installed years ago, as per Willie Crawford, it was never acted upon.


The wooden panel fence at the rear of the Rectory was in danger of falling apart or down, the fencing along the perimeter was made from single wires and broken, plus the hedge was full of barbed wire. At some time, this area was approved as acceptable for small children and dogs...however it was not big or safe enough for either.

There seemed to be a misunderstanding about the fence as two were shown on the drawing we had and it was not explained that St Mary's was responsible for one area, while The Douglas Trust the other area. It had just been known as The Rectory for a long time and no division was known, until Ben and Christine found some old documents. These documents showed an inner fenced area and a perimeter fence.

After Ben and Christine arrived, they started to clean up the hedgerows and pull out all the old wire and fencing as it was dangerous to children (they were planning a congregational BBQ)

and their dog. The inner fencing was confusing as it did not surround the Rectory but only ran along the rear of the cottage.

They assumed, as had others for years, that the property border was along the North and East Fields that Willie Crawford owned, between the woods and Ratho Park Carvery reed bed/field owned by The Douglas Trust, around the rented cottage property and along the Rectory driveway.



After discussions, Vestry approved fencing the property accordingly. As with other projects, it was difficult to find a tradesperson to do the job at a reasonable cost and took several months to source the work.



The contract was finally given to Gillan Fencing of Kirknewton. They cut back the hedgerow to allow for fence installation, removed all deadwood from North field boundary (which resulted in 10-15' of additional land gained over roughly 70m), installed 15 straining posts (some of which had to be dug by hand),

installed picket fencing and built a small gate, installed 6 new gates allowing pedestrian and equipment access to the property (septic tank and property maintenance), installed 240m of stock fencing and posts, installed 240m of top railing and 68m of chicken wire fencing to stop garbage from Ratho Park.

### Rectory Septic Tank Repair by Ben Bright

The cover of the Rectory septic tank has needed repairs for a while. It is constructed of three concrete slabs laid over the tank and

supported by metal bars beneath them.

This appears to be the original tank and is larger than most as it had to accommodate the Choir School. Over the years the slabs had been damaged when they were moved to allow the tank to be cleaned. One of the slabs was broken and there was a fear that it would fall into the tank. The slabs were



also damaged along the adjoining sides creating gaps that were unhealthy, dangerous and allowed rats to enter the tank.

After consulting with the Wardens and the Dalmahoy Estate Office it was determined that a new top should be built, and a proper access hatch installed.



Alclean Drainage came out to have a look & suggested that the best and most cost-effective way to do the work was to leave the



existing slabs in place and use them as a base to make a new one-piece top.

The broken part would be cut out, the opening being built up by bricks and a lintel so that a hatch could be installed in that area. The top row of bricks in the opening area also needed the pointing redone as it was crumbling. However, the rest of the tank could be left as is.

The Dalmahoy Estate sent someone down to empty the tank also. The Estate may be sharing the cost with St Mary's, although I have not received written confirmation yet, only verbal.

#### Music in June and July



Joseph Haydn died 210 years ago on 31 May 1809. On his visits to England, he was amazed by the hold the dead Handel still had over the English people, and was inspired to write a large Handelian oratorio of his own, 'The Creation', completed between 1797 and 1798. It was an immediate hit with the public, and remains one of the favourite oratorios of amateur choral societies. The last performance Haydn attended

in person was in the year before he died. According to one account, the audience broke into spontaneous applause at the coming of the 'light' and Haydn, in a typical gesture, pointed upwards to heaven and said: 'Not from me - everything comes from up there!'



Georgi Aleksandrovich Mushel was a Russian composer who made his home in Tashkent, Uzbekistan, as Professor of Composition at the Tashkent Conservatoire. There he wrote music inspired by the rich traditions and music of Uzbekistan. This famous Toccata comes from his 'Uzbekistan Suite'. Legend has it that Noel Rawsthorne (who died

this year on 28 January) discovered this piece on a concert tour of Russia and arranged for its publication by the Oxford University Press in 1966.



Although Alfred Hollins was born in Hull, he settled for the last fifty years of his life as organist of St. George's West Church in Shandwick Place, Edinburgh (now the new home of Charlotte Chapel), for which he had designed the organ. He continued to compose and give recitals all over the world, despite being blind from birth.



Healey Willan was another English organist, born in south London, who found fame outside England. In his thirties, he emigrated to Canada, where he became Professor of Music at the University of Toronto, and organist of the Anglo-Catholic church of St. Mary Magdalene, Toronto.



Fanny Mendelssohn lived under the shadow of her more famous brother, Felix. At her own wedding, because Felix was ill and unable to complete the music for the ceremony, she wrote her own wedding pieces, one on the night before! She is also credited with the invention of the 'Song without Words', a form in which Felix later excelled. The 'Mélodies' (Op.4) could quite

legitimately be called 'Lieder ohne Worte'. Fanny is now emerging from her brother's shadow as a major composer in her own right.



OK, here's a pub question for you: 'Name three Belgian composers'. Belgium's national day (21 July) falls on a Sunday this year, giving me a good excuse to perform music by three of the best-known organ composers from that country: Flor Peeters, Jacques-Nicolas Lemmens and César Franck. Lemmens, the founder and first principal of the Lemmens Institute, is

also famous for composing the best-known Storm for organ!



Finally, some excellent advice on hymnsinging from the founder of Methodism, John Wesley, which was printed in 'Sacred Melody', the musical supplement for his shorter hymn book 'Select Hymns with Tunes Annext: Designed chiefly for the Use of the People called Methodists', published in 1761 (typography warning: there are a great number of examples of

the long 's', which looks rather similar to an 'f'!):

That this Part of Divine Worship may be the more acceptable to God, as well as the more profitable to yourself and others, be careful to observe the following Directions.

I. EARN these Tunes before you learn any others; afterwards learn as many as you please.

II. Sing them exactly as they are printed here, without altering or mending them at all; and if you have learned to fing them otherwise, unlearn it as soon as you can.

III. Sing All. See that you join with the Congregation as frequently as you can. Let not a flight Degree of Weakness or Weariness hinder you. If it is a Cross

to you, take it up and you will find a Bleffing.

IV. Sing lustily and with a good Courage. Beware of singing as if you were half Dead, or half a Sleep; but lift up your Voice with Strength. Be no more asraid of your Voice now, nor more ashamed of its being heard, than when you sung the Songs of Satan.

V. Sing modestly. Do not baul, so as to be heard above, or distinct from the Rest of the Congregation, that you may not destroy the Harmony; but strive to unite your Voices together, so as to make one clear me-

lodious Sound.

VI. Sing in Time: whatever Time is Sung be sure to keep with it. Do not run before nor stay behind it; but attend close to the leading Voices, and move therewith as exactly as you can; and take care you sing not too slow. This drawling Way naturally steals on all who are lazy; and it is high Time to drive it out from among us, and sing all our Tunes just as quick as we did at first.

VII. Above all fing spiritually. Have an Eye to Godin every Word you ling. Aim at pleasing Him more than yourself, or any other Creature. In order to this, attend strictly to the Sense of what you sing, and see that your Heart is not carried away with the Sound, but offered to God continually; so shall your singing be such as the Lord will approve of here, and reward when the cometh in the Clouds of Heaven.

Thank you to those of you who reviewed your donations following the last article in In Touch.

#### **Gift Aiding Your Church Donations**

As we receive a proportion of anonymous donations in the plate, in this issue I wanted to mention Gift Aid. St Mary's can claim 25p for every £1 you donate. However, to do so you need to provide a declaration. If you would like to check whether St Mary's holds a Gift Aid declaration in your name, please contact Geoff Angell or myself. Geoff can also arrange offertory envelopes to ensure we can claim Gift Aid on any money you give to St Mary's via the plate.

Your donations will qualify for Gift Aid as long as they're not more than 4 times what you have paid in tax in the current tax year (6 April to 5 April). If you do have a change in circumstances and stop paying enough tax for St Mary's to claim Gift Aid, please let Geoff or myself know.

#### Moroccan Lamb – for two

2 lamb leg steaks (or 3 if hungry!)

To make up your Moroccan Spice (make more and store for future use)

½ tspn garlic powder ½ tspn paprika

½ tspn ground cumin ½ tspn ground ginger

2 heaped tspns ground coriander seeds (freshly ground is best – I love coriander!)

½ tspn ground cinnamon ½ tspn chilli powder (mild)

Olive oil spray

1 heaped tspn of Belazu Rose Harissa (I find this brand has the best flavour)

6 tspns crème fraiche

Trim all fat from steaks. Mix spices together, sprinkle on a plate and coat the steaks fully. Spray steaks with olive oil. Leave to stand for at least 10 minutes to absorb the flavour of the spices.

Heat a griddle pan to high temperature. Cook steaks for two minutes per side (adjust timing to suit taste and thickness of steaks – thick steaks, pink = 2 mins per side). Allow to rest for 5 minutes, before carving into slices.

Mix harissa and crème fraiche together. Serve on steaks or in separate small ramekins.

Serve on a bed of boiled rice or Jewelled Couscous or griddled vegetable salad, as preferred.

"That's easy," said Charles. "First and Second Samuel."


