

Happy New (Liturgical) Year!

The wheel has turned full circle, and we are once more at the beginning of a new liturgical year. This time it's Year A again in the Revised Common Lectionary.

Advent brings with it the usual pattern of staying awake on the first Sunday (*Wachet auf*), rejoicing (*Gaudete*) on the third Sunday (and wearing rose pink!), and the familiar 'O come, O come Emmanuel' on the last nine days before Christmas (a period of preparation known as a 'novena'). These 'Great O' antiphons are sung before and after the Magnificat at Evensong during this period.



Midnight Mass this year brings with it the world premiere of a new piece by my wife, Tina, 'The light

shineth in darkness', a quotation from the familiar first chapter of St. John's Gospel set for Christmas Day.

A number of different themes come together on the **Sunday between Christmas and Epiphany**: the circumcision / naming of Jesus, the murder of the Holy Innocents, and, of course, New Year's Day.




Celestial lights feature at **Epiphany** with three preludes on *'How brightly shines the Morning Star'* by composers from Belgium, Denmark and Germany.


On **Epiphany 2** I play three pieces from my wedding repertoire. As yet, no-one has asked for the Mouret piece, but it's similar in character to the well-known Prelude to the Te Deum by Charpentier (think Eurovision!)

The readings for **Epiphany 3** centre on the prophecy of Isaiah: 'The people who sat in darkness have seen a great light, and for those who sat in the region and shadow of death light has dawned.' As with many prophecies over the Advent / Christmas season, this text has been set by Handel in 'Messiah'. The postlude is a brilliant toccata by Theodore Dubois: 'Fiat Lux'.

My programme for Advent and Christmastide concludes on **Epiphany 4** with three pieces



by the blind virtuoso organist and composer Alfred Hollins, who spent most of his working life in Edinburgh. His Benediction Nuptiale



was 'Specially composed for the marriage of The Rev. Hugh Black D.D. with Miss Edith Kerr' in 1898. Black was the minister of St. George's West, Shandwick Place, who had appointed Hollins as organist the previous

year. The piece is based on a three note theme which in the German spelling is H-E-B, the initials of Hugh and Edith Black.

Once we are past Candlemas on Thursday 2 February, we immediately enter Septuagesimatide on Sunday 5 February, when our attention turns away from Christmas and we prepare for the coming of Lent.

A message from John Burnett

With sorrow, I have to announce the death of Andrew Burnett, younger son of Myrtle and Southern and brother of John, who died suddenly at the end of July 2022.



St.Mary's Dalmahoy, Walking Group (1980's - 2022).

Many of you will find it hard to believe that nearly 40 years ago, soon after I came to St.Mary's, Mary Hall (now living in Meikleour) and I started a small walking group, joined by many friends from outside St.Mary's.

One of our first rather ambitious walks, was to attempt a 20 mile section of the Southern Upland Way, on the first Saturday in June 1986. The S. U. W., stretches for 212 miles from Portpatrick (nr.Stranraer) on the South West Coast, to Cockburnspath on the East Coast, and was established in the 70's. Our first section, we appropriately started from St.Mary's Loch, finishing at the Episcopal Church in Melrose, where we joined in their Saturday evening service, and the kindly provided evening snack. It went so well that we decided to attempt all of it. So from 1986 until 1990, we covered the remaining Eastern sections as far as Moffat on the first Saturdays in June, normally hiring a coach to get us to the start point, and relying on our partners or friends to meet us at the end of each walk. A huge thanks to the many non-walkers, who on some of the sections, would

meet us in the middle of the stretch and give us lunch.

The Western section, from Moffat to Portpatrick, (1991 to 1994), we completed over 4 weekends by hiring 2 self-drive mini-buses, and walking on the Saturday and Sunday, staying overnight at convenient Youth Hostels. This is a photograph of the group at the finish point



in Portpatrick. Therefore, we walked the 212 miles in a total of 14 days. You can imagine that much organising went on in the background, to make sure everything worked well.

Following that, over the next 15 years or so, we changed the pattern to 2 weekends away, then down to one. Mainly in Scotland, we stayed at Hostels (sometimes B & B's) at places such as Kinloch Rannoch, Roy Bridge, Rowardennan, Bridge of Orchy, Glen Doll, and Caputh, and in England, near Hadrian's Wall, Alnwick and Heversham. Over this period we climbed a few Munro's, Ben Nevis, Ben Dorain, Ben Lomond, Lochnagar and Schiehallion, walked the Lairig Ghru from nr. Braemar to Aviemore, parts of the West Highland Way, and many other challenges of about 10 miles or so.



You will realise, that for those of us who started out in the 1980's, age was taking its toll and we were not quite as active as we used to be. So, from about 2012 we arranged to meet up once a year for a shorter walk and evening meal together. It just so happens that Mary Hall and I have our birthdays on the same

day in early September, so we decided to arrange the get-togethers around that time. Over the years, some people have moved away, and sadly a few are no longer with us. Mary and I, now well into our 80's, decided that the time had come to bring these memorable times to an end, so this September, our by now much small group had our last meal together at Ratho Park.

The Ash Wednesday service congregation were told to "Remember you are butt dust and into dust you shall return".


The invitation after a carol service was for "Mice pies at the local pub".

Recipe: Stacey Aswad's Candied Maple Pecans

- 500g raw pecans
- 227g pure maple syrup
- 1 Tbsp filtered water
- 1/2 tsp ground cinnamon or more to taste
- 1/4 tsp nutmeg or more to taste
- pinch of ground ginger or more to taste
- pinch of cayenne pepper or more to taste
- pinch of sea salt
- 1. Preheat oven to 180°
- 2. Roast pecans for about 8-10 minutes until slightly crispy and fragrant.
- 3. In a saucepan, heat the maple syrup and spices on a medium heat for about 5 minutes until warm and slightly bubbling.
- 4. Add in the warm roasted pecans and the filtered water.
- 5. Stir and fold through for about 3-4 minutes until the nuts caramelize and the mixture reduces and is completely absorbed.
- 6. Lay the nuts out on a baking tray lined with parchment paper, and allow to cool and harden. This takes about 15 20 minutes.

Devour warm, or store in an airtight container.
