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

Pastoral Letter from Christine

Dear St. Mary's:

The world needs us to be bearers of hope and needs communities of people who are able to articulate why being a people of hope is not foolishly naive, but an intelligent, responsible



and faith-filled way of living.

The world we live in is getting smaller and more complicated. While we have access to all the information in the world, many are confused and lost. Our lives are shaped by an economic system based on personal acquisition, which nurtures our desire for more things, yet we still grapple with poverty and suffering in our towns and nations, as well as in our hearts. We – and our young people in particular – carry legitimate fears about the future, relating to the environment, climate change, and the rate at which we are consuming the earth's natural resources.

I have had conversations people, whose search for meaning is genuine – who are attracted to, or at least not adverse to, belief in God, who would like very much to lay hold of the hope which is borne of faith, but aren't convinced that it would be intellectually honest to do so.

In turn, many who continue to actively be a part of the Church also struggle with doubts, often unarticulated, which are unsettling and keep us from living the depths of hope and joy to which our faith invites us.

Our culture is struggling to find meaning; seeking answers to their deepest questions.

It is in Christ's self-gift on the cross that we clearly see the face of God. The resurrection proclaims God's power and God's desire to transform death into life, darkness into light, despair into hope. It is



the eternal reminder that we are not alone in the world, that new life can rise from ashes. And it places human freedom, into a larger framework, where everything is caught up in God's redeeming work.

Immersing ourselves in the natural world – the smell of the moist earth,

the first time you hear the sound of returning birds in the spring, raking away the dried crust of winter on the lawn, walking on a road under the sheltering sky — can be a renewing and transcendent experience. Taking time to be with others, over a meal or having tea with a friend — such fundamental encounters are a reminder of the dignity and sacredness of each person. The experience of beauty or

kindness can be a way of opening the human heart to an encounter with God.

Hope is evoked in all these places, just as it is evoked in the simple tasks of daily life, and in moments of quiet and contemplation. Above all it is born in love, the love which helps us move outside of ourselves.





The experience of love vanquishes doubt much more than any intellectual argument does, no matter how much the latter is needed.

Hope is deeply attractive.

May we continue to be guided by the Holy Spirit as we creatively seek ways of giving an account of our hope. And

may we experience the joy of being able to name life-giving reasons for our hope, letting those reasons shine forth for all to see and hear.



Dalmations

Since the report for the AGM was written there have been two Dalmatians meetings. This should have been three, but the November



meeting was cancelled due to electrical problems stopping the heating working in the Douglas Hall. Luckily, we were able to contact the speaker, Eric Melvin, on the morning to cancel. Eric will now give his talk on A Visit to Edinburgh Castle in April.

In October, Patricia Keppie of the Commonwealth War Graves Commission came and talked to us on the work that they carry out across the globe. The Commonwealth War Graves Commission's mission is to ensure those who died in service, or as a result of conflict in the two world wars, are commemorated so that they, and the human cost of war, are remembered for ever. The cemeteries, memorials, graves, landscapes, and records in their care will be found at 23,000 locations and in more than 150 countries and territories. St Mary's Dalmahoy has 2 War Graves in our graveyard and Patricia was able to give some background on them.



The annual Dalmatians Christmas Lunch was held in December. As usual it was a very enjoyable event. Including entertainers, guests, and regular attendees there were around 30 people present. The Castaways ladies singing group returned to sing a

programme of Christmas songs and carols which got everyone into the festive mood, as in previous years an outside caterer provided a cold buffet. The tables were decorated, a sweet, liquid refreshments, and crackers were provided, A good time was had by all.



The small raffle was held and £45 raised. This money was donated, with £25 going to Alzheimer's Scotland and £20 to The Seagull Trust.

We are now into a new year and have a programme that takes us up until April.

On January 31st we are holding the annual fun day. It's a chance to have a laugh while taking part in some fun activities such as games and quizzes. A good way to lighten the winter blues.

On February 28th Carole MacBride is going to talk to the group on the Child in the Rough charity. By the time of the meeting Carole will have visited Kenya twice with the charity, so will be able to give an informed talk on their work. This is a charity that St Mary's has supported in the last year.





Another charity that St Mary's has supported recently is Aquabox, which provides safe drinking water and humanitarian aid to people affected by natural disasters, extreme weather and conflicts. Alun Morgan is coming on March 27th to tell us more about the work of this charity.

Finally, as mentioned previously, on April 24th Eric Melvin will be at St Mary's to give his talk on A Visit to Edinburgh Castle. Eric has spoken to Dalmatians a number of times before and his talks are very interesting. I'm sure that he will come up with a lot of facts that people are not aware of.

Hymn of the Lent season: "Be Still, My Soul"

Katherine von Schlegel; trans. Jane Borthwick;

Ancient & Modern Hymnal, No.594

Be still, my soul: the Lord is on your side.

Bear patiently the cross of grief and pain;


Leave to your God to order and provide;

in every change, God faithful will remain.

Be still, my soul: your best, your heavenly friend

Through thorny ways leads to a joyful end

The hymn "Be Still, My Soul" has an interesting origin story that spans over 100 years and three countries: Germany (original text), Scotland (translation), and Finland (tune: Finlandia by Jean Sibelius). While little is known about the author Katharina Amalia Dorothea von Schlegel, there is speculation that she may have come from an aristocratic family and been associated with the court at Köthen in Germany. She several collection contributed texts to a called Neue Sammlung geistlicher Lieder (A new collection of spiritual songs) in 1752.





During a period of five years, Johann Sebastian Bach served as a director of music at the court of Köthen, where it is assumed, he was working in close proximity to Katherine von Schlegel. During this time, he had access to an incredibly well-equipped court chapel and worked under Prince Leopold, who was a great lover of music. Bach



wrote many orchestral and chamber pieces for the regular concerts held at the Köthen Palace, including the first part of the Well-tempered Clavier. Unfortunately, his time in Köthen was marred by the unexpected death of his first wife, Maria Barbara. As a result, the 35-year-old widower, who was now the

sole caretaker of four children, quickly fell in love with the court singer, Anna Magdalena. The couple married in December 1721 in a joyous ceremony.

Katherine von Schlegel's hymnody is characterised by faithfulness to Scripture, personal experience, and deep emotional expression. It is worth noting that she is considered to be the leading female hymn writer of this period.

The hymn we know today was translated by Jane L. Borthwick (1813-1897), a distinguished member of the Free Church of Scotland who contributed greatly to bringing the riches of German hymn heritage to the English language.

It is noteworthy that her translation included five of the original six stanzas, and it appeared in *Hymns from the Land of Luther*, second series (1855)

Be still, my soul: when dearest friends depart, and all is darkened in the vale of tears, then shalt thou better know his love, his heart, who come to soothe thy sorrow and thy fears. Be still, my soul: thy Jesus can repay from his own fondness all he takes away.

Be still, my soul; thy God doth undertake to guide the future as He has the past. Thy hope, thy confidence let nothing shake; all now mysterious shall be bright at last. Be still, my soul; the waves and winds still know His voice who ruled them while He dwelt below.


Be still, my soul; when dearest friends depart, and all is darkened in the veil of tears, then shalt thou better know His love, His heart, who comes to soothe thy sorrow and thy fears. Be still, my soul; thy Jesus can repay from His own fullness all He takes away.

Be still, my soul; the hour is hast'ning on when we shall be forever with the Lord, when disappointment, grief, and fear are gone, sorrow forgot, love's purest joys restored. Be still, my soul; when change and tears are past, all safe and blessed we shall meet at last.

Dear St Marys Dalmahoy Church,



I am writing on behalf of A Child in the Rough to personally thank you for your financial contributions to our non profit organisation in 2023. With your support we were able to feed the entire school 2 hot meals a day for an entire month. Your generous donation of £280 has also sponsored one of our grade 6 students through their first year of Junior Secondary School which they will start this week. Your support and generosity towards our efforts in Kenya are greatly appreciated.

As you will be aware, A Child in the Rough provides education, meals, aid and emergency medical care to Star of Wonder School in the Kibera Slum of Nairobi, Kenya. Without support from organisations and communities like yourself we could not do the work we do.

This year we have more projects to move forward with to improve the conditions of the school and continue progressing Star of Wonder into the safe haven that it has become. With another trip planned for the end of this month I plan to be on the ground in Nairobi for just under 3 weeks to undertake some of these vital projects. I would like to graciously reach out to ask if you would consider allocating any additional funds towards new projects in 2024.

The main goals for this trip will be to provide every teacher with a new, functioning desk as currently many teachers are sitting on a chair balancing work on their lap. This comes at a cost of around £500. Additionally, we are planning to install shelving and storage in each classroom in an effort to protect the workbooks and textbooks from the dust and dirt of the slum, ensuring they stay in good condition for longer – currently there are no storage solutions in the classrooms and this project would come at a cost of around £400. Whilst these are the main issues needing addressed, there are ongoing costs of projects such as investment into textbooks, new uniforms for the most vulnerable students, monthly food supplies and water tank refills.

We would be incredibly grateful if you would consider our non profit organisation for further support in 2024 and if any additional funds could be allocated towards these much needed projects. Once again, I would like to give a massive note of appreciation and thanks for your support in 2023. Myself and the organisation as a whole would like to express utmost gratitude.

As most of you know, St. Mary's has been a supporter of Mary's Meals almost since the start, and you will have noticed in the Sunday Service sheets, that we support Dole Primary School in Malawi. That came about because St. Mary's raised enough money to have a kitchen added to the school to provide breakfasts for all the students. John Helliwell has given over 600 talks to various organisations over many years, and some of us know the Macfarlane Barrow family as many of us have stayed at their centre in Dalmally on many occasions in the past.

I myself have continued to give regularly, hence the possible reason for having my name linked to a particular school. They have apologised for only giving me one "I" in my name. Geoff Angell



Applesauce Cake

2 cups sifted all-purpose flour	240g
1 tsp baking soda	5ml
1 tsp cinnamon	5ml
½ tsp each, salt, ground cloves & nutme	g
½ cup butter	227g
1 cup sugar	200g
2 eggs	
1 cup thick unsweetened applesauce	250ml
3/4 cup raisins or dates	150g
½ cup pecans or walnuts	100g

Sift together flour baking soda, cinnamon, salt, cloves and nutmeg; set aside

Combine shortening, sugar & eggs. Beat a med 11/2 mins. Add applesauce and flour mixture; beat at medium-low 11/2 mins. Stir in raisins and nuts. Spread into 8in. square baking pan. Bake at 180° 50-55 minutes


